Updates of Interest
Nationally, seasonal influenza activity remains elevated across the country. CDC estimates that there have been at least 15,000,000 illnesses, 180,000 hospitalizations, and 7,400 deaths from flu so far this season. Please see CDC's latest [flu-like report](#) for more information.

Influenza-associated Pediatric Mortality
Nationally, seventeen (17) influenza-associated pediatric deaths have been reported for the 2025-2026 flu season. No influenza-associated pediatric deaths in Michigan have been confirmed by MDHHS for the 2025-2026 season.

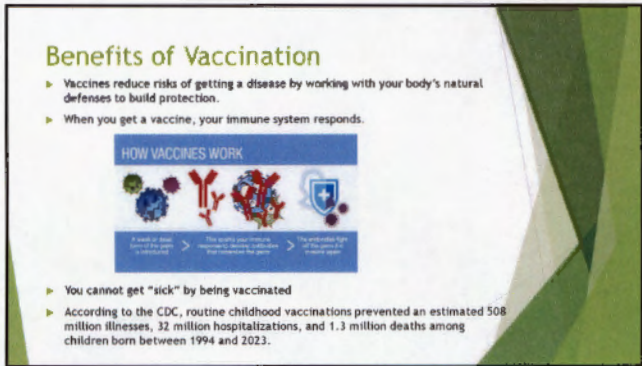
Severity of Influenza

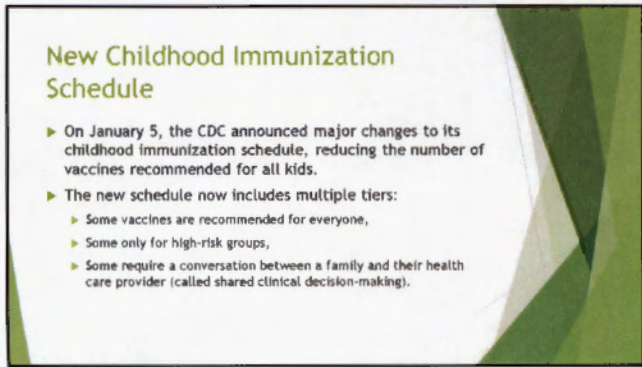
- ▶ According to the CDC, 2024-25 was the highest severity flu season in more than a decade, with 280 flu-associated pediatric deaths (source *CDC Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Review*)
- ▶ As of January 9, The CDC estimates that there have been at least 15,000,000 illnesses, 180,000 hospitalizations, and 7,400 deaths from flu so far this season, including 17 pediatric deaths.
- ▶ Influenza A (H3N2) viruses are the most frequently reported so far this season.

Severity of Influenza

- ▶ Each year, new variants of the flu emerge, and scientists work to develop a flu vaccine that offers the best possible protection against these new strains of the virus.
- ▶ This year's vaccine was designed to protect against a H3N2 strain known as subclade J.2.
- ▶ Subclade K emerged after the development of this year's Influenza vaccine, and data suggests that Subclade K spreads efficiently and is becoming more prominent.
- ▶ Despite the new variant (Subclade K), vaccine effectiveness estimates show that this season's flu vaccine does provide protection and reduces serious outcomes, preventing 70-75% of flu-related hospital visits for children and 30-40% for adults.







What Midland County Department of Public Health is Doing

- ▶ The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) issued a statement reaffirming their previous recommendation to follow the child and adolescent immunization schedules produced by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP).
- ▶ MCDPH will follow the standing recommendations of the State's Chief Medical Executive and adopt the immunization schedules published by AAP and AAFP as the standards of care for immunization practices.
- ▶ MCDPH will continue to provide science-based public health services in a compassionate and respectful manner.

History of the Rotavirus Vaccine

- ▶ Rotavirus is a double-stranded RNA virus of the reovirus family. The most common symptom of rotavirus infection is watery diarrhea.
 - ▶ It may also cause fever, abdominal pain, and vomiting.
- ▶ In about 1 in 50 cases of rotavirus illness, children develop severe dehydration from diarrhea and vomiting.
- ▶ Hospitalization is usually necessary in these cases, and children are rehydrated via liquids delivered via a nasogastric tube or intravenously.

Vaccine Development

- ▶ The first vaccine for rotavirus, RotaShield, was licensed and recommended for routine childhood immunization in 1998. However, in 1999 the vaccine was pulled back due to safety concerns.
- ▶ No rotavirus vaccine was available until 2006, when Rotateq was added to the routine infant immunization schedule.
- ▶ Another rotavirus vaccine, Rotarix, was authorized for use in the United States in 2008.
- ▶ Both Rotateq and Rotarix are administered orally and are in use today.

How Vaccine Helped Control Rotavirus

- ▶ In the pre-vaccine era, an estimated 2.7 million rotavirus infections occurred every year in the United States and 95% of children experienced at least one rotavirus infection by age 5 years.
- ▶ Rotavirus infection was responsible for 410,000 physician visits, more than 200,000 emergency department visits, 55,000 to 70,000 hospitalizations, and 20 to 60 deaths annually in children younger than age 5 years. (Source CDC)
- ▶ Researchers estimate that an average annual 280,000 clinic visits, 62,000 emergency department visits, and 45,000 hospitalizations for rotavirus disease were averted among U.S. children younger than age 5 years during 2007-2011 by routine vaccination. (source CDC)

Putting Risk in Perspective

- ▶ Historically, vaccine guidance has been shaped by extensive evidence and scientific rigor, often using decades worth of data and a multitude of studies.
- ▶ No global vaccine standard exists...each country must assess their individual disease risks, medical infrastructure, and capabilities to respond to an outbreak.
- ▶ Skipping or delaying vaccines can put kids at risk for serious illness or even death.
- ▶ Most vaccines are still covered by insurance and government programs in Michigan.
- ▶ Your child's medical provider is the best resource for questions about what vaccines are recommended and when.

County Services Building- Kevin Beeson

- 1) Phase 2 remodel timeline slipped a bit over the holidays, but crews are busy with finishing touches on both floors. Furniture should arrive in the next couple of weeks, with move-in coming shortly thereafter.

Courthouse - Kevin Beeson

- 1) The snowmelt system had one minor hiccup getting going this year. We had it corrected and back online within a couple of hours. It continues to perform better than we expected. The cleanliness inside the Courthouse is certainly enhanced by dry shoes and boots walking through the doors.
- 2) Repaired a cabinet-unit-heater on level 100.
- 3) Installed an astronomical timer on the parking lot lights. This unit continually adjusts the start/stop times of the lights based on the day of the year.

Jail Update (4) - Kevin Beeson

- 1) As of Monday, January 13th, we are currently responsible for 187 inmates. Local Midland County inmate count is 112, with 74 Federal Marshal Inmates, and one Parole detainee.
- 2) New Year, new hires. Lots of work for Chris making photo ID's for both road and corrections officers.
- 3) Ice and wind brought Consumers Energy lines down twice over the Christmas break. Generator ran, as it should. Colby came in and spent hours getting all of the HVAC equipment reset and back on line.

LEC - Kevin Beeson

- 1) Nothing to report.

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Juvenile Care Center (JCC) (4) - Kevin Beeson

- 1) Made repairs to a couple of stubborn cameras. They seem to be working, as they should now.

Pinecrest Update (4) - Kory Priest & Kevin Beeson

- 1) Census: 53, January 7, 2026
 - Admitted one & Discharged zero, Tours given - two, Tours scheduled – zero, Pending Admissions--one, Inquires – five.
- 2) Administrative/Facility:
 - One resident guardianship will be changing from Catholic Family Services to MPG services.
 - One new guardianship in process.
 - One petition for guardianship is in process.
 - Kory is working with three residents to zero out their SSI payments in order to assist them applying for SDA and the Medicaid Supplement.
 - Assisting three residents with the Medicaid application process.
 - Two residents are on Hospice services for added support.
 - Annual health assessments for all residents have been completed.
 - One resident currently works at the Arnold center.
 - Two resident are being assisted with obtaining a job.
 - Resident/family Christmas party was on December 17th. 58 family members attended, Santa Claus showed up for pictures with the residents and we had live entertainment.
 - Sharing tree gift exchange party was on 12/23.
 - Weekly and biweekly psych visit and counseling services continue to be tremendous help with our residents. One week is the practitioner and the next week is the social worker, or at any time, we need help (medication change or addition).
- 3) Staffing:
 - One full time remains on medical leave through June 2026 (position temporarily filled).
 - One part time remains open due to backfilling the FT (position temporarily filled).
 - One PT LPN position is open (interviews in process)
 - One On call LPN is being on boarded
 - Two FT RA's will be retiring in early January. One position has been signed for internally, by one of the on-call staff. The second position – the applicant is in the onboarding process.
- 4) Donations:
 - YTD = \$9,206.96; includes Strosacker Foundation Grant - \$5,000.00.

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- 5) Activities: Biweekly shopping trip to Dollar Store, Chair yoga, movie and popcorn nights, Bible studies, Walking Club, Bingo, cards, and board games, nail care, Wii Bowling, Karen on the Accordion, lunch outing to McDonalds, painting class, Horse Racing, monthly birthday party with ice cream social and recognitions, Thrive program and vouchers received from the MSU extension office for the six week nutrition class. L.E.A.P. program, Thrive program, Chair Tai Chi for Better Sleep and Arthritis - The class is provided through the MSU extension.
- 6) Colby has replaced one furnace as planned. This work will continue as time and weather permits.
- 7) Repairs have been normal and everything is holding together nicely.

Community Corrections- Marisa Boulton

- 1) Successfully submitted monthly enrollment/termination information into COMPAS Case Manager for all Community Corrections Programs. Submitted monthly invoices to the county and State. (1,2,3,4)
- 2) Coordinated in-patient substance abuse treatment for six individuals for FY2026 (53 coordination's in FY2025) (37 coordination's in FY2024). (1,2,3)
- 3) Network Therapy is our Drunk Driving third offense program. There are currently eight active participants for the FY2026, with two successful completions to date. (17 participants, eight successful completions in FY 2024) with several referrals pending. (1,2 3,4)
- 4) Attended Mental Health Court (established 2020) meetings and courtroom sessions. Mental Health Court currently has 11 participants with four pending referrals. There have been 11 graduates since the beginning of the program in 2020. (1,2,3,4)
- 5) Attended Recovery Court (established 2010) meeting and courtroom sessions. There are currently 11 active participants with a graduation today, and one pending referral. There have been 90 graduates since the inception of the program in 2010. (1,2,3,4)
- 6) The MiHOPE program (established 2015) currently has 26 participants in the community with four pending referrals, one in TRI-CAP, and five in jail. NOT ABLE TO APPROVE ANY NEW REFERRALS DUE TO BUDGET. There have been 64 graduates since the start of the program in 2015. This means 64 Midland County residents have been diverted from prison, paid their court costs and fees and found meaningful employment. (1,2,3,4)
- 7) Pretrial Programming remains busy. In FY2026, there have been over 86 Pretrial assessments. There are currently 111 people on community supervision. Six are on GPS tether, four are on Remote Breath and eight are on SCRAM. Our current success rate is 92%. Our current public safety rate is 100%. Average number of days people are on supervision is currently 186 days. The appearance rate is 94%. FY2025 Stats: 249 pretrial assessments completed resulting in 164

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individuals placed on pretrial supervision. Average number of days on community supervision was 203, with a success rate of 90%. Jail bed days saved 28,355. 28355 X \$100 day = 2.83 million saved.

- 8) There are currently 14 residents at TRI-CAP and 11 are participating in the Opiate/Meth Specific Program. There have been 41 successful completions this fiscal year. Current jail bed days saved since October 1, 2025 is 960 with a success rate of 88%.
- 9) Other FY2025 program enrollment numbers: Jail education has worked with 76 students. Seeking Safety groups have had 79 women attending with 32 successfully completing. Men's Groups (Helping Men Recover and Cognitive) had 160 people attending with 92 successfully completing. Recovery Coaches continue to meet with people in the jail and in the community that are participating in groups or are participants in MiHOPE, Recovery Court or Mental Health Court Programs. (1,2,3,4)
- 10) Skills for Tomorrow/Community Construct continues to be very busy with new customers. They have a new website [Skill-Building & Recovery Support | Community Construct Inc. | Midland, MI.](#) (1,2,3,4)
- 11) Marisa is assisting the Jail Captain with planning of Recovery Pod. Marisa went to Kane County, IL, to tour their facility and speak to the inmates in the program. (1,2,3,4)

Equalization- Chris Gaumer

- 1) Equalization Study has been submitted to the State and certification filed.
- 2) Chris begun a project to digitize the remainder of the department's historical data.

Emergency Management- Jenifler Boyer

- 1) Emergency Management Coordinator continues to participate in the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Flood Study and MBA Critical Infrastructure meetings. Emergency Management Coordinator presented on grant projects completed by the emergency management office as part of the public update with the USACE on 09/24. (4)
- 2) Hazard Mitigation Plan has been approved by FEMA on condition that it is adopted by the County and Local Jurisdictions. Once approved by FEMA, the Emergency Management Coordinator will present the plan to the County and all local jurisdictions for adoption. (1,2,3,4)
- 3) Deputy Emergency Management Coordinator working on solutions to organize and deploy shelter supplies and developing a Community Shelter Plan. (2,3,4)

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- 4) The RFP for replacing our emergency siren system in coordination with the City of Midland is ready to be posted. (1,2,3,4)
- 5) Dec 10th evaluated Kent County Dam Failure Exercise. (1,2,3,4)
- 6) Dec 12th presented to 1in6 Community Organization on Disaster Preparedness for families with vulnerable loved ones. (2,3,4)
- 7) Emergency Management Coordinator is the sitting President of the Michigan Emergency Management Association. Current report is being coordinated statewide to show current investment across the state, in Emergency Management, including use of federal grant funds that FEMA is proposing to eliminate. This will help inform our elected officials of not only the need for continued programing and funding from FEMA, but also an increase in funding locally.

Finance/Budget/Administration Update- Tiffany Eddy and Bridgette

- 1) Dec General Fund YTD Revenue = \$37.0M
Dec General Fund YTD Expenditures = \$39.2M
Dec General Fund Reserve Balance = (\$12.2M)
- 2) Audit fieldwork has been preliminarily set for the week of April 6th.
- 3) Beginning year-end audit closing/reconciliation processes. (3,4).
- 4) Added new employee pay rates, vacation balances, and open enrollment selections/changes for 2026.
- 5) Mileage rate for 2026 is 72.5 cents per mile – 2025 mileage reports are due on February 2, 2026.
- 6) Working on 12/31/25 State quarterly reports with departments.
- 7) Working on year-end State/Federal reporting: W2s, 1099s, 1099Rs, 1095Cs, 941, 940, 945, etc.

FOIA/Communications- Jessica Gilkins

- 1) Prep for 12/2 BOC, 12/9 Executive, Finance and A&O Committees, and 12/16 BOC.
- 2) Coordinate receipt, review and response of **74** new records requests.
- 3) Continue to work through Board & Commission vacancies – compiling applications and communications from individuals interested in appointments.
- 4) Submit reservations and book travel for Commissioners attending the NACo Legislative Conference in Washington, D.C.
- 5) Draft 2026 Organizational documents and 2026 schedule.
- 6) Assist various departments as needed with finding/rescheduling conference room reservations.
- 7) Assist various departments with website updates.

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- 8) Provide FOIA software training and/or troubleshooting for various departments.
- 9) The transition from BoardDocs to Civic Plus is complete. The software is still new to staff so please be patient with us. There is a separate Board portal that is specifically for Commissioners – if you are interested in going paperless and learning more about using the portal, please let Jessica know!

GIS- Chris Cantrell

- 1) Aerial imagery project, conducting quality controls on the imagery. (2)
- 2) Updated Narcan data/maps for the Health Department. (2)

Health Department- Fred Yanoski

- 1) The MCDPH continues 2025-26 influenza and COVID vaccinations by appointment and at Tuesday walk in clinics. Clinics will continue based on demand and availability of vaccine. In Michigan, we are now “very high” levels of flu. ER visits have increased over the past few weeks for flu, COVID, and RSV. Michigan ILI (Influenza like illness) activity is up to 11.3% (US is at 8.2%). The majority of the flu viruses reported by public health laboratories (approx. 98%) have been influenza A. Of those subtyped, 91% were H3N2 and with those that had additional genetic characterization at CDC, 91% were subclade K. For the 2025-26 respiratory season, 23.9% of Michiganders have received influenza vaccine and 8.3% of Michiganders have received COVID-19 vaccine. In Midland County, we have 26% of our residents vaccinated for influenza and 10% vaccinated for COVID-19. Flu vaccine prevents millions of illnesses and flu-related doctor's visits each year. Getting yourself vaccinated may also protect people around you, including those who are more vulnerable to serious flu illness, like babies and young children, older people, and people with certain chronic health conditions. (2,3,4).
- 2) MCDPH continued to support area universities and students by hosting two public health interns during the fall semester from Saginaw Valley State University (a graduate student and an ungraduated student), as well as weekly placements for nursing students. (2,3,4)
- 3) MCDPH Medical Director continues to represent local public health on the Michigan Advisory Committee on Immunizations (MACI) work group. This work statewide work group of public health/medical experts was created to advise and provide feedback to MDHHS on responding to the current challenges and barriers to vaccinations, as well as the evolving changes at the federal level.

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MDHHS Chief Medical Executive Dr. Bagdasarian issued a standing recommendation to health care providers and families to support the existing childhood vaccination recommendations. Medical Director continued leadership role in Overdose Fatality Review, which reinforced the work needed with substance use disorder and the importance of harm reduction activities. (2,3,4)

- 4) MCDPH staff continues partner with local agencies to enhance and improve harm reduction activities throughout Midland County. New initiatives include a syringe service program and the exploration of increased access to recovery coaches (in partnership with Peer 360 Recovery Alliance). (2,3,4)

Human Resources- Suzanne Ault

- 1) Vacant positions: JJC – Juvenile Specialist – On Call and Part Time. Sheriff's Dept. – Part time Corrections Deputy. Pinecrest Farms – on call Resident Associates and Nursing Supervisor. HR – HR Director – full time. Parks and Recreation – Manager – Full Time.
- 2) Negotiations with the Corrections Officers is nearly complete.

Information Technology- Chris Cantrell

- 1) Exchange Online 365 migration project –
 - IT is down to a few departments, Facilities plus anyone that was missed. (2,3,4)
 - Once that is completed, IT will be working on changing our email domain to midlandcountymi.gov.
 - IT will also be working on the MS Office licensing after the email migration.
- 2) CSB remodel:
 - New data center is now fully operational. All equipment has been moved over by each of the occupants that use our room.
 - IT is working with Facilities to decommission UPS and A/C in old computer room.
- 3) The holidays came with more than just Santa Claus. Phishing and fake emails really ramped up this season. (1)
- 4) As a recommendation from the FOC audit, we have implemented an external scanner to increase our security footprint. (4)
- 5) IT is working to set up a meeting with Spectrum to bring service into the county. This will allow service to the monitors in the conference rooms + we can switch the public wifi access to Spectrum. This will preserve our bandwidth and maintain security.

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MCoNet

- 1) No update this month.

Remonumentation

- 1) End of year Peer Review is finished. Submission of Land Record Certificates to the State and Register of Deeds is due this month followed by the grant closure report for 2025. (4)
- 2) The 2026 grant application was submitted. (1)

Managed Assigned Counsel – Leland Burton

- 1) Conducted arraignment interviews and represented 76 defendants at first appearance, which is roughly half the norm.
- 2) The number of cases where an attorney was appointed landed at 52 cases, which is at the low end of the normal range.
- 3) For FY25, appointed attorneys represented 684 defendants, which is down just about 15% from the previous year.
- 4) During 2025, added four attorneys to the panel. The panel now consists of nine attorneys, which is the highest level yet. Midland has enough attorneys at every level of qualification to meet the expectations of MIDC.

Mosquito Control- Carl Doud

- 1) The insecticide bid opening occurred January 7th. Purchase recommendations will be made and forwarded to the BOC in the coming days. (3,4).
- 2) The year-end report and the technical program for the 2026 season are being reviewed by staff and will be submitted this month. (3, 4).
- 3) In development are various annual requirements such as the 2025 Public Outreach plan and application to the DNR for approval to apply larvicide to state forest areas. (3,4)

MSU Extension- Mark Rankin

- 1) Dave Wishowski (Sugarbeet Advancement Educator)
 - Sugarbeet Advancement has published the 2025 field trial results, and the data has been released for public viewing.
 - Annual Meeting for Sugarbeet Advancement committee and REACH will be held on January 30th, where next year's field trial varies will be selected and announced.
- 2) Dee Howe (4-H Program Coordinator)

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- Mindful Me classes were conducted for new teachers.
 - China Cultural exchange at three schools.
 - Introduction of Dealing with Feelings (3rd graders) is starting next month.
 - Introduction to Thinking it Through for highest elementary grade is coming this spring.
- 3) Tanner Derror (Health Educator)
- Our MiSUPER "An overview of the Opioid Overdose Crisis and its Impact on our Communities" Webinar was facilitated last month, with a total of 22 participants. This program promoted in collaboration with the Midland Coalition for Substance Free Resiliency.
 - Connecting with Midland Senior Services Health Education Coordinator to expand programing to other sites.
- 4) Robin McGuire (Science STEM Educator)
- Code Club continues to meet on the second Saturday of every month, working on Vex Robotics.
 - Project Club will begin on the 4th Saturday of every month; this is a "spin-off" of code Club. Students will be working in small teams and designing a project. Interests range from underwater robotics, Innovative Vehicle Design Challenges, Rocketry, and cybersecurity.

Parks and Recreation- Patrick Clark, Director

- 1) Branches were cut and cleared at the Santa House in preparation for the lighting ceremony. (2,3)
- 2) Patrick and the Park Commission Chair (Roy Green) interviewed four candidates for the Park Manager position. No offers for second interviews were offered. (1,2)
- 3) Fish habitat work via Heinz Tree Service was completed adjacent to Sanford Lake Park. Heinz Tree Service no longer is in need of access to the north end of Sanford Lake Park. (1,3,4)
- 4) Patrick worked with the Midland County Road Commission to have a test strip cut on the Pere Marquette Rail Trail to understand their equipment's capabilities for possible future work/partnership. (1,3,4)
- 5) Core samples were conducted by McDowell Geotechnical Services at the 7 Mile parking lot in Sanford to understand the subgrade before pursuing repair/replacement of the asphalt parking lot. (1,3,4)
- 6) Staff compacted snow at the Pine Haven Recreational Area on 12/12/25. (2,3)
- 7) MDNR TF25-0149 application was among those recommended for funding by the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund (MNRTF) Board of Trustees to receive a grant for \$400,000.00. A formal grant offer will be made in the form of a project agreement (PA) after funds are appropriated by the State Legislature. This process could take 4-6 months (or possibly longer). (1,2,3,4)

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Public Guardian Services- Steve Wixson

- 1) Filled out DHHS annual redetermination paperwork. (1,3,4)
- 2) Steve is working on client accountings and inventories. (3,4)
- 3) Steve's petition to transfer a case to another county was granted. (3,4)
- 4) Steve is attempting to set up new clients, and bring back clients to Midland. Some of our AFC homes have openings. These clients had to be sent out of county initially as there were no available beds. (3,4)
- 5) Steve received two calls from Adult Protective Services concerning people needing assistance. It appears that both cases will become clients soon. (3, 4)
- 6) The office had a client overdose. The client survived, and changes made to this client's case. (3,4)
- 7) The office has seen an increase in the amount of local providers that need the guardian to be present at appointments. Our case manager has helped attend many appointments. (3,4)
- 8) Attended several doctor appointments with clients; working on closing out cases for a client inventories; working on finding local placement for clients; completed several face-to-face interviews to determine needs. Working on several clients care for medical, mental health needs, and domestic violence. Office is busy with complicated cases this month. Steve is assisting clients with multiple needs. Steve is looking for new housing for clients.

Trial Court Administrator – Patrick Czerwinski

- 1) Caseload – District Court has 15 jury trials scheduled through mid-February. Circuit Court still has 35 jury trials scheduled through July of next year. Overall numbers continue to rise. The Courthouse anticipates another busy year.
- 2) FY26 Opioid Settlement Funds – the Steering Committee selected six agencies to receive Opioid Settlement Funds for FY26. Draft service agreements were completed in early December and have already been submitted to Corporation Counsel for review.
- 3) All three courts are working on annual reporting requirements with SCAO. This includes the submission of a comprehensive caseload report for each court along with various other reports required by Court Rule.
- 4) Specialty Court Funding Planning – All three-specialty courts continue to pursue all potential grant opportunities. MiHOPE is currently looking at several opportunities to help support the program after recent cuts in state funding.
- 5) JIS – Courthouse staff expect additional case management system updates in Juvenile Court this coming spring or summer. However, we do not have a date yet. Additionally, e-filing implementation in Probate court could happen later in the year – currently exploring whether any additional equipment will be needed.

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- 6) JCC – Effective January 1, 2026, the name of the Juvenile Justice Center has reverted to its previous name, the Juvenile Care Center. Updating efforts are ongoing.
- 7) MiHope Success Story – A male MiHope participant was sentenced into MiHOPE in 2022 and successfully graduated almost exactly two years later in December 2024. He was charged with delivery and manufacturing of meth with sentencing guidelines of 72-180 months in prison. After successfully completing TRI-CAP, he fully immersed himself into the recovery community, and often volunteered at recovery events with our recovery coaches. He immediately began searching for work, which he found but eventually found better employment at Huhtamaki and was hired there and is still working there to this day. The participant remains sober, healthy, and happy more than three years after being accepted into MiHOPE and more than a year following graduation.

Veterans Affairs – Kevin Meyer

- 1) Continue moving forward with core support activities:
 - Bruce continues to reach out to veterans - VFW on Bay Road, American Legion in Midland, and in Sanford. He is reaching out to the community center for contacts, and will be present at the Community Center.
 - Renee completed training and will be assisting Veterans file their service connected disabilities. She will attend several events with Bruce.
 - Kevin continues to promote advocacy for Veterans in the community.
 - Great turn out from the American Legion member, delivering the 26 basket we purchased. Every basket had enough food for a few days helping the Veterans during this time of year.

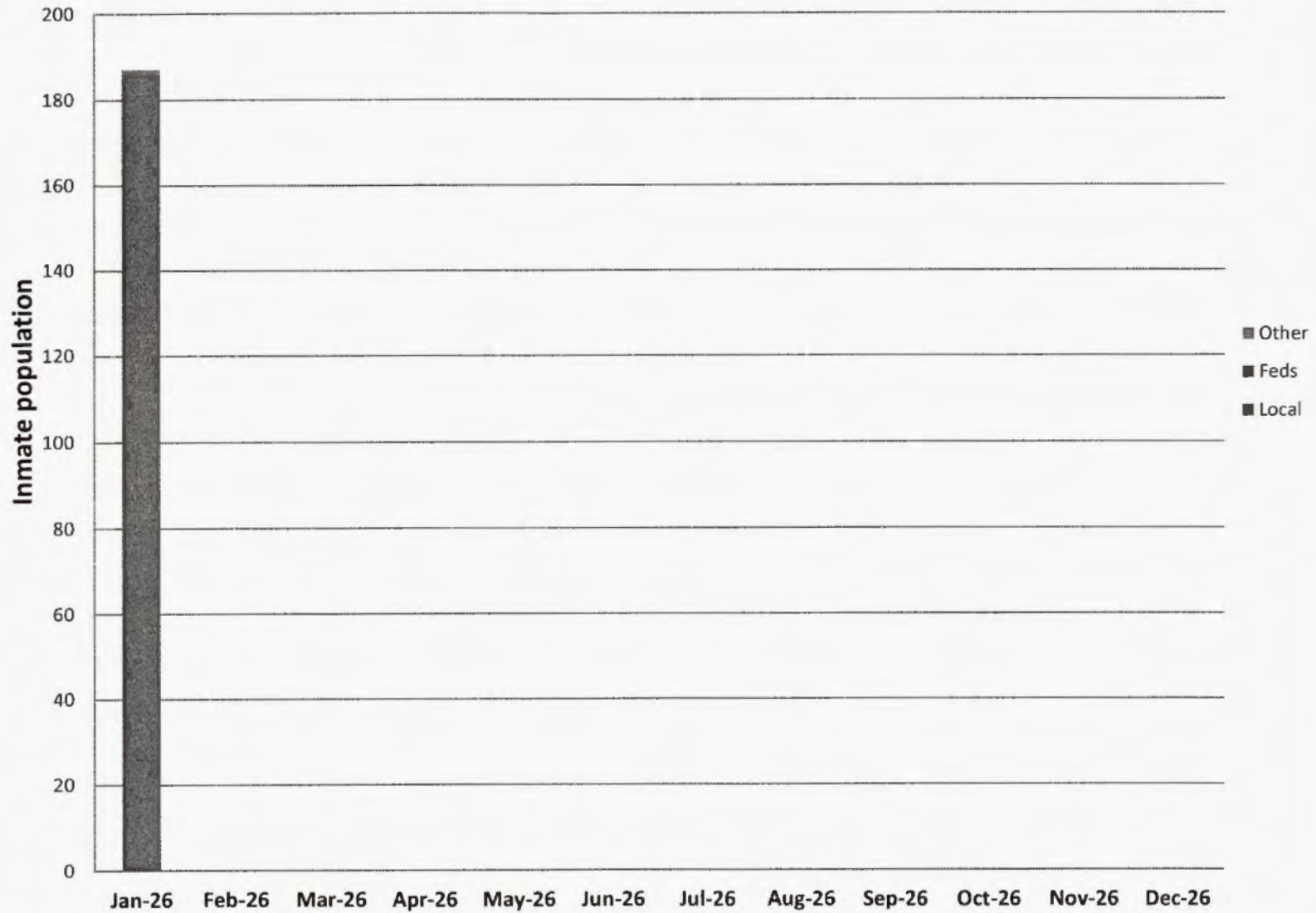

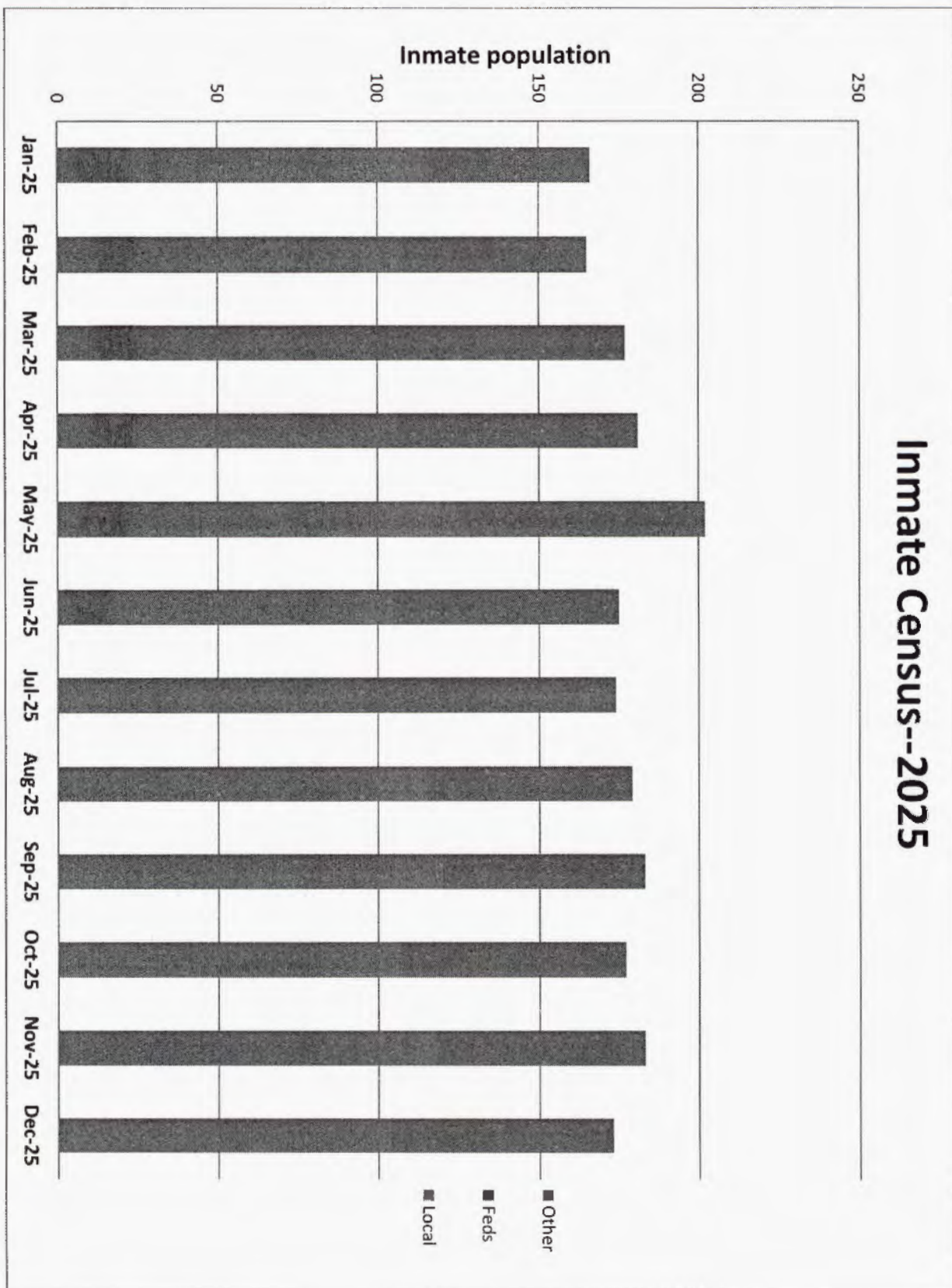

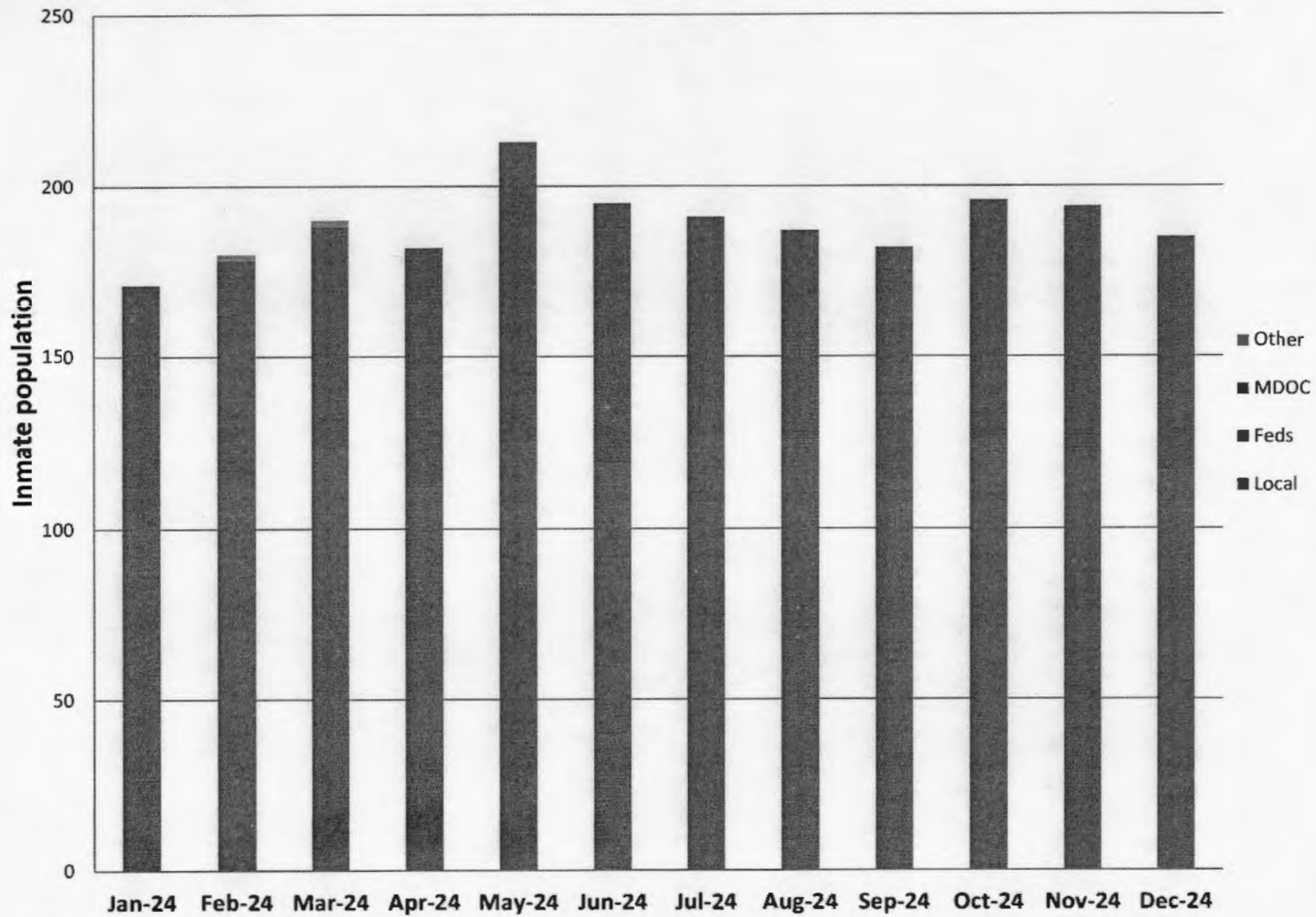
Inmate Census--2026



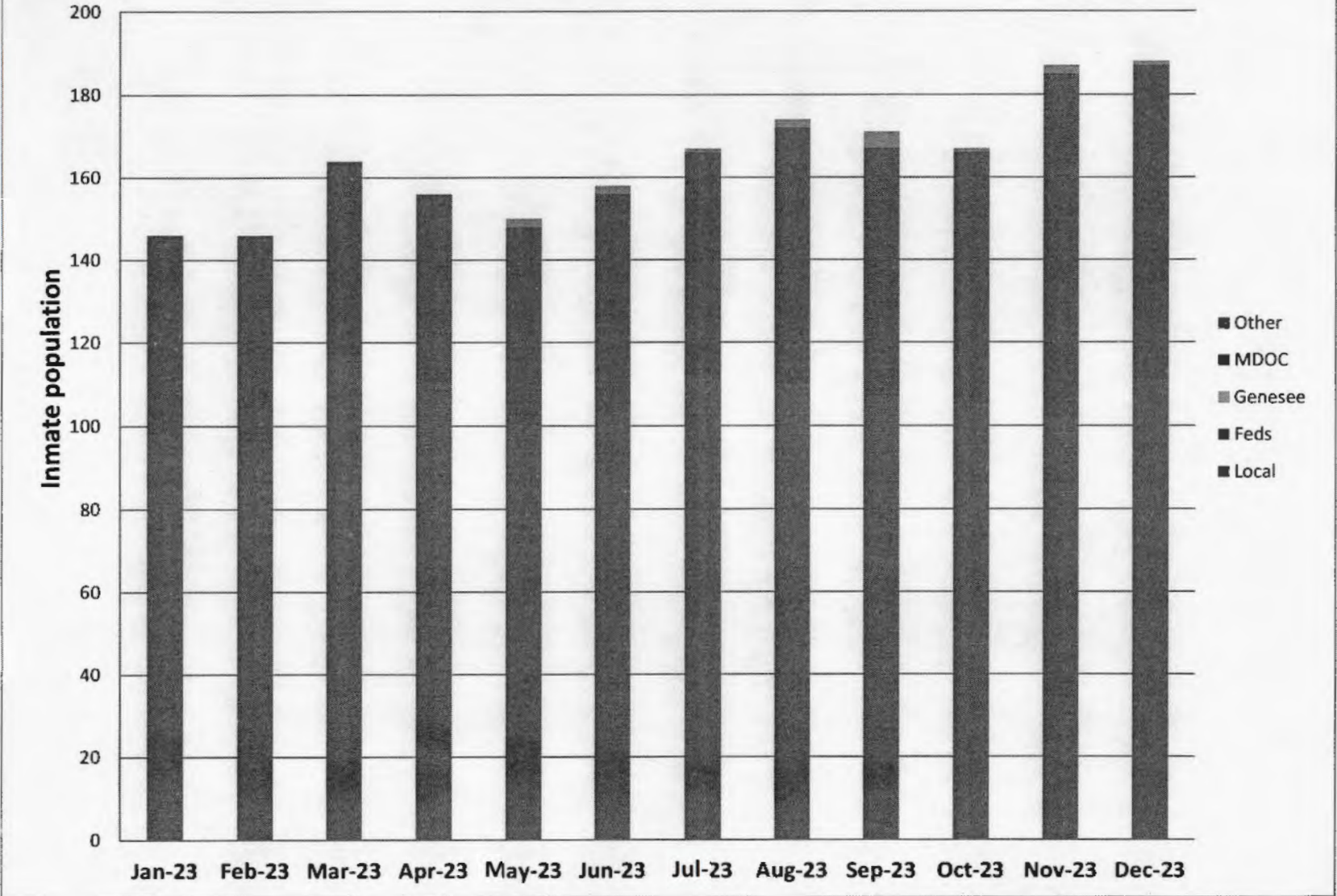
Inmate Census--2025



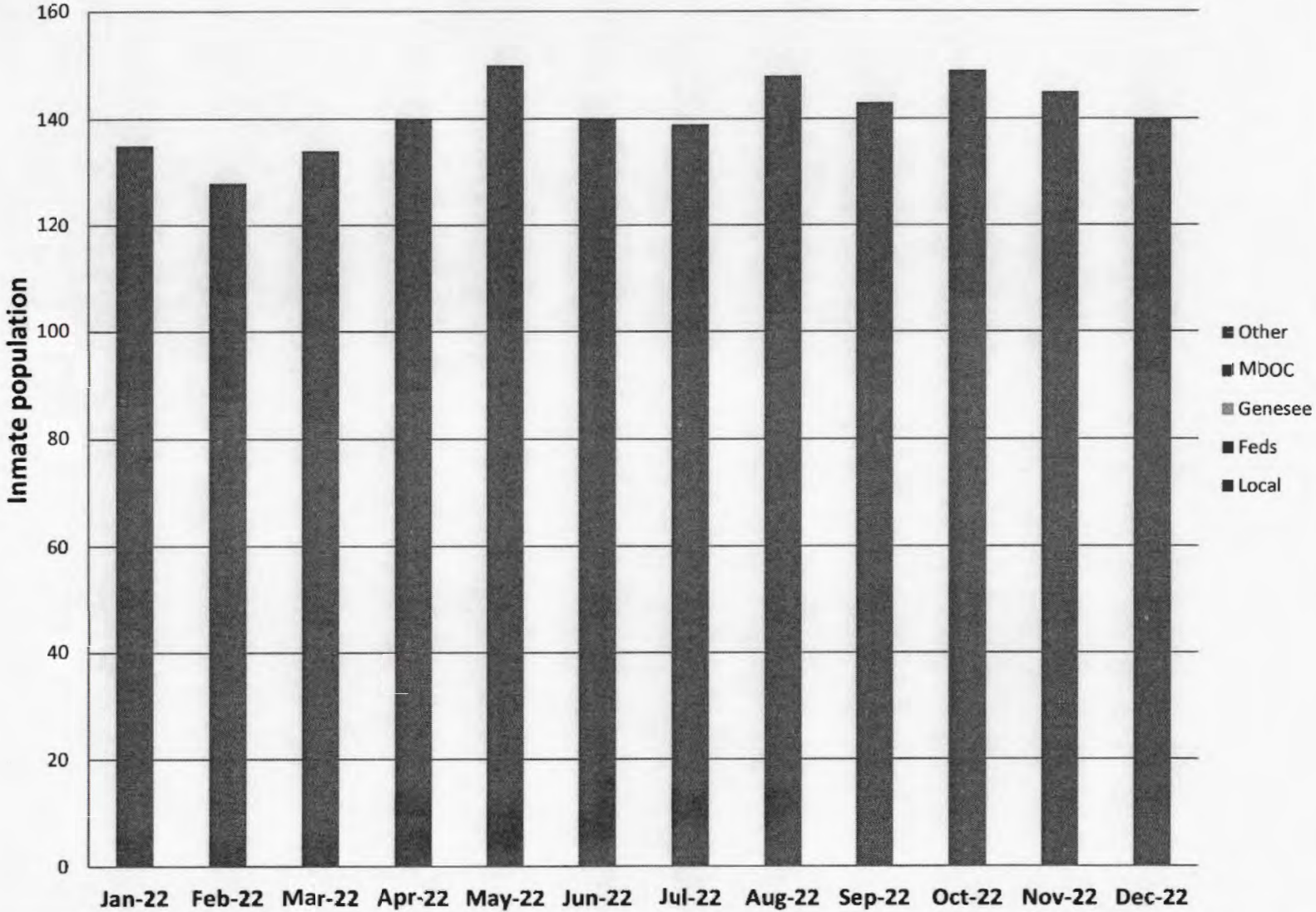
Inmate Census--2024
